On Saturday, September 30th the Newtown Lions held our very first Stuff-a-Truck food drive at the Big Y. The committee wanted the food drive to be easy and fun and it was. Instead of asking shoppers to go up and down the aisles of the Big Y to hunt for items that area pantries need, we presented shoppers with an easy alternative: to buy pre-bagged groceries. We offered 3 options: a "Pasta Dinner" grocery bag for \$5, a "Family Lunch" grocery bag for \$10 and a "Family Dinner" grocery bag for \$20.

The results: A "shopper participation rate" was at least 1 in 3, and possibly as high as 1 in 2. We stuffed a wicked cool military tactical vehicle with approximately 300 pre-bagged grocery bags valued at \$3,500. Shoppers also contributed \$1,350 in cash donations.

We're grateful to the Big Y and the US Army 411th Civil Affairs Battalion for making the event such a great success.



OUR MIRACLE LION

Do you believe in miracles? Do some of the miracles in the Good Book seem impossible? If so, think again for in our midst we have a Miracle Lion. The Lion who has earned this designation is **Dick Kovacs**. In March 2007 he was diagnosed with prostate cancer. Nuclear seeds were installed. Three years later his annual tests confirmed that he was cured. In February 2008 while vacationing in St. Maarten, he suffered a heart attack. Three stents were installed. A year later the tear in his heart was seen to have healed. In May 2011 he was found to have A-Fib. In November of the same year his gall bladder was removed. The next month, cancer of the right lung was diagnosed. Lobectomy of the top lobe of the right lung was performed. After three annual tests he was found cancer free.

In October 2013 he was diagnosed as having breast cancer. Mastectomy of the left breast was performed. Four years later, also in October, bladder cancer was removed. In June 2023 a biopsy indicated that he had superficial cancer on his vocal cords. Just a little over a month ago he had laser surgery and 85 to 90 percent of the cancer was removed. Upcoming radiation will complete the treatment.

Our Miracle Lion attributes his survival was due to the many great advancements in the medical technology. He also adds, "It would really be a miracle, if we cured our hate for one another worldwide!!'

MOVIE REVIEW of "ASTEROID CITY"

Wes Anderson's "Asteroid City" (2023) stars Tom Hanks and Scarlett Johansson, among others. It's another quirky exploration of family, history, and trending American obsessions from the director of "Moonrise Kingdom, the Grand Budapest Hotel", "The Life Aquatic with Steve Zisaou" and others.

"Asteroid City" is set in the mid-1950s, the Modern Age of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs). It centers on a desert outpost on the California/Nevada border that mimics the American West at a time in America when atomic bombs were tested, and a massive UFO wave swept across the nation. Yes, despite eyewitnesses who were thoroughly convinced they'd viewed something otherworldly, the military and Project Blue Book took reports and investigated, only to control the narrative that everything could be explained as "swamp gas" the planet Venus, and mass hysteria. Anderson showcases this government suppression of truth in a small fictional town, Asteroid City. After the entire cast of characters witness a UFO descend from the night sky and a tall black alien descend from the craft, the U.S. Military arrives, quarantines everyone in town, and cuts off communication with the rest of the world.

At a glance, "Asteroid City" seems pure nostalgia. It mimics the look of cinema's pre-Panavision obsession with expansive Cinemascope and the overly saturated colors often depicted in films of the 1950s and early 60s. Anderson's cinematography offers camera pans and tracking shots that immerse viewers in comic book colorful landscapes, quirky costumes, storybook signage, 1950s-era cars, diners, trains, a large meteoric crater, and an observatory. Bryan Cranston narrates the film in Rod Sterling style as the "Host."

But there's more going on behind the captivating visuals. As is so often the case in Wes Anderson films, there are well behaved but troubled kids trying to understand the world and their parents—those present and dead. Conversely, there are parents who are struggling with their own pasts and what it means to raise children.

Something else sets "Asteroid City" apart from other Wes Anderson flicks in both place and time, the film is set near the experiments that led to the recently developed atomic bomb. Once it was birthed by Oppenheimer and his crew, the bomb became an unforgettable specter in everyone's life. It birthed fear and anxiety in many. In others, it triggered the suspicion that if life existed off world, it might take interest in a species so eager to annihilate itself. (Think of the alien's visit and warning in "The Day the Earth Stood Still"). For all its quirks and distracting visuals, "Asteroid City" resonates with the same message. It reminds us that the many human problems being tackled then are true now.

Bottom line: "Asteroid City" entertains. How much you cull from it is up to you.

STRANGE BUT TRUE


So now cocaine is legal in Oregon, but straws aren't. That must be frustrating.

While many people like to binge on their favorite television programs, my version of binging is with those authors who captivate me with their writing style and subject matter. David Grann is one of those authors. Some of you may be familiar with Grann's book "Killers of the Flower Moon", the movie version of which is now in theaters.

The book is a nonfiction tale of the shipwreck of His Majesty's Ship, the Wager. In 1740 the Wager set sail from England in a secret mission in the quest of a Spanish galleon laden with treasure off the coast of Chile. The book begins with Grann introducing us to the central characters; Captain David Cheap and the ship's gunner, John Bulkeley. The Wager was not the most seaworthy of vessels and by the time that it rounded the hazardous Cape Horn, disaster struck, and the Wager shipwrecked on a remote

island off Patagonia, the southernmost area of South America. And the harrowing story of the struggle for survival on an unforgiving desolate isle begins. As the months drag on, Cheap and Bulkeley separately vie for the loyalty of the 145 survivors. Anarchy ensues, and the surviving members of the crew, after enduring sickness and murder, split into two camps. In 1742, thirty survivors, emaciated and barely alive, in a battered vessel skippered by Bulkeley, washed up on the shores of Brazil, three thousand miles away. Six months later three castaways came ashore in on the west coast in Chile. The group in Chile claimed that the thirty survivors of the Wager who landed in Brazil were not exactly honorable people, but mutineers. After both groups arrived back in England, a court martial commenced. The story of human behavior at its worst was recounted by both parties at this time with the guilty ones facing hanging.

David Grann traveled the route that led to the demise of the Wager and also visited the island (Wager Island) where the shipwreck took place. His extensive research for this book and the way that it is masterfully knit together results in a delightful page turner that I thoroughly enjoyed.
