It's Here! It's Now! It's a Disaster!

Call it "Global Warming," call it "Climate Change," call it what you like... We are experiencing a number of unprecedented events, the likes of which this planet has never seen.

It's easy to become overwhelmed, to believe that it's "Fake News," weaponized by Politicians on both sides of the aisle, to think that it's someone else's problem to solve. After all, what can we do to reverse the catastrophic melting of ice sheets in Greenland or the Antarctic... and what does it matter, anyway? We live approximately 400-800 feet above sea level. Yes, but 600 million people worldwide live on the coast, within 30 feet of current levels. Think Manhattan, Long Island and Florida.

Wildfires happen. Yes, but not at such a record pace and not to the extent that we are advised to stay indoors due to extreme air quality issues. Consider the on-going tragedy and fatalities in Hawaii... And yes, we have experienced brushfires in our area this year.

Water scarcity: 771 million people lack access to clean, fresh water. That's 1 in 10 people on the planet. It's not simply a water problem. It's about access to the right water...

What can we, in Fairfield County, do about that? Maybe support the companies that are already taking steps to improve matters?

There are many reputable sources of information you can research to better-understand different aspects of the problem. Experts know the facts and have articulated them well. Al Gore's "Inconvenient Truth," Thomas Friedman's "Hot, Flat and Crowded," John Grisham's "Grey Mountain" to name a few. You don't need to read the statistics, just look at the pictures!

Here are just three themes:

Coal: Why is it an issue? Where and how is it used? What are the alternatives?

Greenhouse Gases: What are they? Where do they come from? How do they affect the climate? What can we do to mitigate their effects?

Deforestation: Where and why does it happen? How fast is it happening? How long will it take to repair the damage already done.

Once you have the information, you can start making connections. Then you can begin to think about actions you might want to take.

For instance:

Cars are a major purchase item. It takes a lot of thought before making a decision on what make of car/model to buy.

We're not asking you to exclude your existing preferences. Buy the car you want. Of course you should. What we are suggesting is that you consider including environmental impact in your decision... EVs and Hybrid technology are moving at breath-taking speed.

The infrastructure these vehicles need e.g., charging stations is catching up fast. They may be more expensive than their internal combustion counterparts today, but there is a payback period, and it may not be as long as you think. It's worth checking out. If you are not ready for that big a jump, consider downsizing.

Cheaper to buy and cheaper to insure. A Honda Pilot gets 20 mpg in town, a CRV 28mpg. That's a 40% improvement in mileage. Good for your wallet and good for the environment... just as reliable and easier to park!

The average American spends 8 minutes in a **shower** (someone actually calculated that!). Standard shower heads use 2.5 gallons per minute... so 20 gallons per shower. That means an average family could save almost 3000 gallons of water per year, just by installing a 2 gallon per minute shower head. Same shower experience... less environmental impact._Take it a step further. Spend 6 minutes in the shower instead of 8... Or 8 instead of 10 and save 20-25% of your water volume used. Remember, it's not just the cost of heating the water, it's the cost of getting the water to your home and treating the wastewater. All impact your pocket-book and of course the environment.





NEW Movie Review of "Oppenheimer" by Gary Fillion


